# 2021-22 Annual Report - Programs Submitted by Preston Andrews

After cancelling our March-June 2020 meetings because of COVID-19 restrictions, we moved to a virtual Zoom format for programs for the September-November 2020 programs. We continued using Zoom-only programs in 2021, which included the following speakers and topics:

With the return of in-person meetings, they were moved from 4<sup>th</sup> Saturdays at Sandpoint Community Hall to 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturdays at the Library. This change was made because the Community Hall wasn't available and the meeting room at the Library was only available on 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturdays for KNPS use. The Library offers fast WiFi and other audio/visual technologies to effectively deliver hybrid meetings. However, there were some complications in running the hybrid inperson/virtual meetings, especially for the February and May meetings. The May program was terminated because of WiFi interruptions at the speaker's location. Speakers at remote locations should be well versed in Zoom and digital technologies, and a backup program should be planned should the speaker be unable to present.

### 2021-22 Annual Report - Conservation Submitted by Preston Andrews

Despite the KNPS Conservation Committee being without a Chair or members since 2019, we provided comments for the following conservation issues during 2021-22:

- Support for the proposed listing by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service of Whitebark Pine as "Threatened" under the Endangered Species Act. (January 21, 2021)
- Support letter for the grant request to U.S. Park Service by the Friends of the Sand Creek Basin to study the feasibility of establishing a natural preserve in the Sand Creek Basin within Sandpoint city limits. (February 25, 2022) – <u>Grant was awarded</u>

• Comments on development plans for the Joslyn Property in Priest River that incorporate native plants, preserve wetland habitat, and provide shoreline stabilization with living vegetation. (May 30, 2022)

The Board of Directors will endeavor to reinstate the Conservation Committee by identifying a Chair for the committee.

The Education Committee was formed in August 2021. Our first task was to brainstorm and prioritize expansion and enhancement of our present educational activities. KNPS's Landscaping with Native Plants in the Idaho Panhandle brought in \$3,845 for the year.

Carol Jenkins keeps the stores full of the books. Since its release in 2011, 1,979 copies were printed. In October of 2021another 500 copies were ordered for a cost of \$6,466. Over 150 of this new order have been placed with 8 book stores in Bonner County; 1 in Bonners Ferry; 2 in Coeur d'Alene; and 1 in Moscow.

The Liability policy through Western Community Insurance Co was \$299 for 5/8/22 - 5/8/23. The Directors & Officers insurance from Great American Insurance Group was \$602 for 2/1/22 - 2/1/23.

Lois Wythe grant in 2022 was increased to \$500 and was awarded to the ALT for use at the Arboretum. Judy Lyding is chairperson.

### 2021-22 Annual Report – Arboretum Submitted by Rae Charlton for the Arboretum Leadership Team

The Arboretum Leadership Team is happy to report that the 2021-22 year included three major accomplishments: KNPS has a volunteer built, handsome new cabin as its headquarters; a plaque honoring Lois Wythe has been installed on the kiosk; and the basic work of creating an inventory of native plants in each habitat has been completed. Each of these achievements deserves a bit more elaboration.

The building of the cabin was detailed in last year's report. But in August 2021, we held the annual BBQ in the arboretum, officially dedicating the cabin and honoring all the people who helped make it happen. Great kindness and support from the community made it an uplifting experience (special kudos to Cara's family for their contributions). The dedication even made the front page of the Bonner Daily Bee!

An expanded Arbor Day celebration, sponsored by the city and local organizations such as KNPS and the Bonner County Historical Society was held on May 7 at Lakeview Park. Our booth was especially attractive and educational due mainly to the hard work of Cindy Hayes. Relentless rain impacted attendance, but families who came appreciated the activities for children, including the traditional tree planting. The Arb team was proud to unveil the plaque honoring Lois, made possible by a special gift from Lois' grandson, Joshua Ramey-Renk. Special thanks to our creative and talented Ann Torpie, who designed and personally installed this well-deserved tribute.

Something new: a field trip to the Arb, to verify the plants in each habitat, thereby creating an inventory! That was the program for the June general meeting. Attendees divided up into small groups, each with a leader and a scribe. Leaders had information about what plants were there 20 years ago (!) and a map showing the boundaries of each habitat. They also had iNaturalist on their phones. Ken Thacker put many hours into measuring the Arb, and he and Bonnie created a richly detailed map we can use for future planning. The plant I.D.'s were often challenging, but it added up to a worthwhile learning experience, and created a basic tool which will be well utilized moving forward.
